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## OBJECTIVE

The 1982 annual report on birds of the Calgary area is intended as a report on observations of local interest. Each species is dealt with in some detail and, for the Calgary area birder, each species account should be of great interest. Many years have passed since any similar project has been undertaken. It is important that amateur ornithologists have an outlet to publish their findings.

A report of this kind serves another important function in synthesizing the year's field data sheets and forms. Most workers would agree that the information as herein presented is significantly more available and easier to use than raw data. As stated by Sadler and Myres (1976) "With the appearance of the Victoria Natural History Society's Annual Bird Report for Southern Vancouver Island 1970 (1971 and 1972) and the Vancouver Natural History Society's Vancouver Birds in 1971 we have witnessed the initiation of annual, printed booklets on the birds of a region of Western Canada, on a hopefully continuing basis. Alberta should be able to produce similar reports, as suggested later." "A secondary reason for this publication is to provide a model for future annual or biennial reports on the birds of Alberta that will place on permanent record data additional to that recorded here for 1961-70."

It is also hoped that this publication serves to encourage both ornithological observation in the Calgary area and the submission of those observations to the appropriate clearing house.

STUDY AREA

The area from which observations were considered is a circle with 80 kilometre ( 50 mile ) radius from Calgary and is illustrated by the map overleaf. This map is a portion of the 1977 Alberta Forest Service Base Map. The scale is $1 \mathrm{~cm}=10$ kilometres $\left(1^{\prime \prime}=16\right.$ miles $)$. For the most part observations were limited to this area. However, records of great interest which we considered to have little likelihood of publication elsewhere but were outside the area have been included.


The majority of the records considered are in the files of the Calgary Field Naturalists.' Society (CFNS) at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary. Other records reported to the compilers verbally and considered valid have also been included.

As discussed elsewhere in this report, many rare, vagrant and accidental species require descriptive notes to increase the credibility of the record. Unfortunately, few records in this report are so supported. Most records that are supported by appropriate descriptive notes are specified in the Species Accounts section. Some descriptions were filed with the CFNS, some with B. Gollop in Saskatoon (American Birds regional compiler) and some with the National Museum of Natural History (NMNH) in Ottawa.

WEATHER

Detailed data on the weather for 1982 is available from Environment Canada in its publication Annual Meteorological Summary 1982 Calgary, Alberta. Plotted below, as a solid line, is the mean monthly temperature by month. The normal mean monthly temperature by month is plotted as a dashed line

## Species Accounts Nomenclature

Each species account contains the following:

1. Common and scientific name according to the Thirty-Fourth Supplement to the American Ornithologists Union Check-List of North American Birds (supplement to the Auk) Vol. 99, No. 3, July 1982.
2. May Species Count (May 28 and 29), Calgary Christmas Bird Count (Dec. 19) and Wildlife Reserve of Western Canada Christmas Bird Count (Jan. 1, 1983). For example, $160,0,6$ reads 160 on the M.S.C., 0 on the Calgary C.B.C. and 6 on the W.R.W.C. C.B.C. Where a species did not occur on any of these counts the information is omitted.
3. Occurrence category as below and with reference to Lang et al (1976).
a) Seasonal

- Resident - permanent
- Visitor - summer (breeder)
- winter (non-breeder)
- Migrant - spring and fall
- spring (northward)
- fa11 (southward)
b) Abundance
- Abundant - an observer would see the species in large numbers on any day during the appropriate season and in proper habitat.
- Common - an observer would see the species in small numbers during the appropriate season and in proper habitat.
- Uncommon - an observer might miss the species during the appropriate season and in proper habitat.
- Rare - the species is only recorded by a few observers during the appropriate season.
- Vagrant - the species is outside its normal range and is not recorded every year.
- Accidental - the species is not expected to occur again.

Most species could be assigned more than one occurrence category. For the most part one category was chosen as the most appropriate.
4. Discussion of the year's records. This section is quite variable due to the variety of compilers and species. In general, individual records are specified as follows:

Apr. 29 Inglewood (2) DE
which reads: "On Apri1 29, at Inglewood, two were recorded by D. Elphinstone.

In the shorebird discussion, the compiler frequently expresses the data in five day averages, with $1=$ day $1-5 ; 2=$ day $6-10$; $3=$ day $11-15 ; 4=$ day $16-20 ; 5=$ day $21-25 ;$ and $6=26-30 / 31$. When no counts were made "a" is used. When counts were made but the
species was absent " 0 " is used. The shorebird compiler also uses the term "passage migrant" which in this report is synonymous with migrant.

In some species, data is presented as a chart showing number of records or number of birds per month. Species compiled by D. Elphinstone are tabulated as number of records by month. Species compiled by D. Collister are tabulated as number of birds by month.

## Unusual Records

Most unusual records have been dealt with in the individual species accounts. Where noted, details are available to the interested worker in the Calgary Field Naturalists' Society files. Five detailed descriptions are included in the appendix as examples.

Species requiring descriptions, or at the very least, acknowledgement of their unusual status fall into the following categories.

- any species not dealt with in this report.
- any rare, vagrant or accidental species.
- any bird substantially out of season
- refer to Sadler and Myres (1976).

Recorded during every month, but in the summer, from Calgary, from Fish Creek P.P. only where (2-3) were noted in May, June and July ES, ACS. High counts:

Two high totals in the W.R.W.C. vicinity were; (25) on Nov. 6 at the north end of the Wildcat Hills and (20) on Nov. 25 along Dogpound Creek, Bottrel to Horse Creek Road bridge SJ. The Calgary CBC total is only slightly higher than last year's count (219) but the W.R.W.C. CBC total is almost twice the 1981-2 count (193).
Mountain Chickadee Parus gambeli $1,1,13$ Uncommon resident

In our area, a foothills bird that prefers pines. This species was perhaps infrequently reported because little time was spent in its haunts. The occasional bird is found in Calgary some winters. The only reports are as follows:

At W.R.W.C., where they have nested in the recent past, a pair was observed digging a nest cavity on May 3 but their efforts had been abandoned before a later check of the site. A family group did turn up in the summer however and an adult was still feeding an adult-sized juvenile at the end of Aug. About (15) were counted on a walk from Frederick Lake to Pook Lake, south-east of Morley on Oct. 8. The W.R.W.C. CBC total of (170) is the highest in nine years of the count; the previous high of (135) on the 1979 count was the highest count for Canada that year.

Recorded every month. Winter reports came from Bowmont Flats (1) JJP on Jan. 26 and Glendale (1) TK from Mar. 21-Apr.10. There were reports for three dates in May (not including the May Species Count). Summer reports were from Bulyea Road north-west (1) JJP on June 12; Weaselhead (1) DC on June 12; Fish Creek P.P. (2) ACS on June 20 and Fish Creek P.P. (1) ACS on July 4, 10 and 25. At Lowery Gardens-Edworthy Park (4) RB on July 17 and (2) on July 31. Most Calgary reports however were concentrated in Aug. (1-3/observer on six dates) and Sep. (10 reports, $1-2$ /observer on seven dates). At W.R.W.C., about the same as fall 1981, there were records for 2-3 dates in the latter half of Aug., six dates in Sep. and (1) SJ on Oct. 2. (1) SJ on Oct. 19, (2) SJ on Oct. 24 and (1) SJ on Nov. 11; at Lost Lake (1) RB, SA on Oct. 24; north end of Wildcat Hills (2) SJ on Nov. 6 and north-east of Swanson-Dogpound Creek confluence (1) SJ on Dec. 29. Elsewhere, in Frederick Lake area (1-3) SJ on Oct. 8-9; Bragg Creek-Moose Mountain (2) DC Oct. 16. Widespread during the last week of May and through the summer, including a high count from Irricana to Strathmore (30) JS on July 14 . In June, Calgary reports came only from Fish Creek P.P. and Glenmore Reservoir (maximum of 6 per day) AS, RC. July produced one Calgary report, from Carburn Park (20) 00 on 28 th. At W.R.W.C. there was a family group of SJ on Aug. 13 including three adult sized, yellow gaped juveniles but none were seen there after the end of Aug. The last report from Irricana was (3) J \& MS on Aug. 29 and NamakaEagle Lakes area (2) 1 \& MS Sep. 13. No Aug, reports from Calgary, but during Sep, twelve reports of (1-3) per day with the last at Riley Park (1) JT on Sep 30.

Elsewhere: at Pridd is Slough on June 12 (3) DC and July 10 (1t) RWS; Shepard (1) AW Aug. 1; Midway Lake near Neapol is (1) AW, PFS. Namaka-Eagle-Stobart Lakes (1-2) on Aug. 14, Sep. 6 \& 18 J \& MS, RB, DE. Last report was at Westover Lake (2) SJ on Oct. 6. In July of 1980, (3) singing males in bulrushes and a tatty adult, with food in its bill, near an adult-sized juvenile (fresh plumage) were noted at nearby Frederick Lake. Eight records from Apr. 20-May 4 with (1-4) birds on seven dates, and again from Sep. 23 to Nov. 2 with (1-6) on six dates in Calgary at Lowery Gardens, Fish Creek P.P., Glenmore Reservoir, Riley, Edworthy and Carburn Parks, plus the (4) at Bowness Park, on the CBC. Spring movement at W.R.W.C. coincided with Calgary with (1-2) on four dates between Apr. 25 and May 13. Many more fall and early winter records from early Oct. to the end of Dec. (Nine dates in Oct., four in Nov, and seven in Dec.). Most of these were from within the W.R.W.C. CBC circle, but also from Millarville-Priddis; Brown Lowery Natural Area (27) JT Nov. 11; Bragg-Creek-Cochrane (18) RWS, BW on Dec. 5; Frederick-Pook Lakes; above Kananaskis River at Wasootch Creek; and near Seebe. The (124) total for the W.R.W.C. CBC is extraordinary, almost doubling the previous high of (68) on the 1979 count, the usual being ( $0-8$ ).

First record was Mar. 28 when (6) males were seen together at Sibbald Flats J \& MS and the last record was a flock of (9) at Pook Lake SJ on Oct. 8. There were many reports in April, several with totals of (10) or more. The largest counts were from Highway 1 A at Grand Valley Road (24) AFa on Apr. 7; along the Bow River, Calgary to Bearspaw (15) JJP Apr. 1; in the Turner Valley area (14) AW Apr. 19. Only three reports came from within the city: Apr 1 Bowness (2) JJp; Apr. 7 Bowmont Flats ( 5 m. ) JJP; Riley Park Sep. 22 (4) JT. The largest fall flocks were from Bottrel (20) SJ on Aug. 31 and along the Forestry Trunk Rd. S. of jct. with Richards Road (20) JJJ, LG, SJ on Sep. 23.

## Townsend's Solitaire Myadestes townsendi $0,2,0$ Uncommon to rare

No late winter reports, but a plethora in spring: Sheep River (1) AW Apr. 19; Bowmont Flats (1) JJP Apr. 28; Irricana-Bruce Lake (1) ACS May 1; Deer Ridge in s.e. Calgary (1) KJ, Edworthy Park (1) RB and (4) JJP, all on May 2; W.R.W.C. (1) SJ May 7-8; W.R.W.C. (1) J \& MS May 9. In W.R.W.C. vicinity, none were picked up for this year's May Species count but (1) was found at Ireland Hill LE, SJ, a probable breeding site, on May 24 and June 12 . Rather late breeding was documented on Aug. 6 when RB found (1) at a nest with three eggs along the Highwood River, about 11 km . west of Longview. Fall records from three more piaces in Calgary; Inglewood (1) AW Sep. 12;
Queensland in s.e. Calgary (1) DS Oct. 16 and Riley Park (1) JT from Oct. 26 to Nov. 16 with (2) on Nov. 10. In recent years found on the Calgary CBC in 1978 and during count week in 1981; the (2) on this year's CBC were found along Crescent Road at 7a Street (1) JJP, JM et al and along the Elbow River in Elbow Park (1) IH et al.

Veery
Catharus fuscescens
Uncommon summer visitor
No Veery was reported for the May Count although (2) were located in Calgary on May 30 at Cominco (1) MR, and Glenmore Park (1) RC. These were the earliest reports this spring. Found in Calgary during sunmer at Fish Creek P.P. from June 5 to July 25, with a maximum of (3) on June 17 and July 10 ACS, and at Glenmore Park from June 12 to July 24 with a maximum of (5) on June 13, RC, ACS, DC. The only fall report also came from Glenmore Park (1) RC on Aug. 28-29. There were no reports from outside the city.
Gray-cheeked Thrush Catharus minimus 3,0,0, Rare migrant

Only reported on spring migration with (3) on May 30 in the W.R.W.C. vicinity-singles near Water Valley RWS, at Lost Lake and at Winchell Lake JJP \& SJ. Perhaps coincidentally, the latter two were both found on boggy ground under dense willow brush between the edge of the lake/marsh and adjoining woods. They were very difficult to get a decent look at. In such favoured habitat it seems likely that the species is, for the most part, overlooked.
Swainson's Thrush Catharus ustulatus 17,0,0 Common summer visitor

The first spring migrants were reported from Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (2) DS on May 16; Carburn Park (1) 00 on May 18 and W.R.W.C. (1) SJ on May 20, with all other reports during the last five days of the month. Peak count was at Fish Creek P.P. (6) on May 28-29. Calgary summer reports: Westmount (1) JS on June 6: Lowery Gardens (2) RB on June 7; Weaselhead (1) DC on June 12 and Fish Creek P.P. (1) RWS on July 25. Away from the city, a window-kill at W.R.W.C. (1) SJ on June 7 and reports from Ireland Hill (1) SJ, June 12 and July 11; Stony Creek near Winchell Lake (1) SJ on June 18; Horse Creek Rd. at Dogpound Creek bridge (1) SJ on July 9; Sheep River west of Turner Valley (1) RWS on July 10; and Brown Lowery Natural Area (1) RWS on July 13. Only two fall reports, both in Calgary: Douglas Fir Trail (1) RB Aug. 16; and Fiṣh Creek P.P. (1) ACS Sep. 5.
Hermit Thrush Catharus guttatus $4,0,0$ Common summer visitor

There are very few reports from Calgary, but in the foothills, at least in the W.R.W.C. vicinity from whence came the May Count (4), this species is hard to miss in May, June and July when its song can be heard daily in almost any sizable woodland, even aspen groves with only the odd conifer. Spring records for Calgary were from Carburn Park (1) OD on May 6 and Fish Creek P.P. (1) ES on May 6-7. Fall records were from Riley Park (2) JT on Sep. 30 and (1) JT on Oct. 1 and Lowery Gardens (1) RB on Oct. 3. Records from Apr. 25 through Sep. 21 at W.R.W.C., where SJ watched one during the May 7 blizzard ( 10 cm . of snow) moving from one clump of sedges to the next on the slushy surface of a slough $100+\mathrm{m}$. from the nearest wood associating with a Water Pipit, a few Savannah Sparrows, a pair of Lesser Yellowlegs and several duck. As usual, there were only a couple of W.R.W.C. fall records.

American Robin , Turdus migratorius $120, w k, 0$ Abundant summer visitor
Attempted to overwinter widely in southern Alberta, 1981-2, e.g. on the CBCs-Banff (3), Calgary (7), Red Deer (1), Snakes Head (1) (near Sundre), and during count week at Lethbridge and Edmonton. Five late winter reports from Calgary-at Riley Park (2) JT on Jan. 13 and Carburn Park (1) JT on Jan. 16, Westmount (1) JS on Jan. 16, Weaselhead (1) DC on Jan. 31, and Wildwood (1) AF on Feb. 21. Also Priddis (1) BD Feb. 10. The first spring migrants appeared in Mar, at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (2) DE on Mar 23, Lowery Gardens (1) RB on 25th: Fish Creek P.P. (1) ACS on 26th: and W.R.W.C. (2) AFa on 29 th. By Apr. 1 JJP had counted (17) along the Bow River between Calgary and Bearspaw, but the highest counts for the season were from Fish Creek P.P. (25) ES on Apr. 26, (40) ES on May 3-5 and (65) ES on May 6-7. Migrants were still bottled up during a blizzard at W.R.W.C. (25) SJ on May 8.
The largest number of fall migrants were noted in Calgary during Aug. with (150) ES on 24 at Fish Creek P.P.: during Sep., with (60) AF on 27 at Wildwood in north-west Calgary; (100) DE at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on 30. Smaller flocks were noted in October with (40) RB on 3 in Lowery Gardens; (50) OD on 18 at Carburn Park; (25+) RC, RB on 10 and 19 at Glenmore Park. The last records were at Bowmont Flats (1) JJP on Nov. 4 and Riley Park (1) JT on Nov. 16. West of the city, no flocks larger than (12-15) were reported, but there were several singles in Nov., the last at Ghost Village on 12, and below Ghost Reservoir dam on 19 JJP , SJ. Feather remains of (1) killed on Dogpound Creek were found in fresh snow on Nov. 25 south-west of Bottrel SJ. One was found in Dec. during the Calgary CBC's count week.

Listed as a fairly common summer resident at the Kananaskis Forest Experiment Station (Powell, Sadler \& Powell, June 1975) at the west edge of our area, where breeding is probable though unproven. Further east, where rare, overshot migrants are reported most years, this year, one spring record, at W.R.W.C. during a blizzard, on May 8 (2) SJ, and one fall record, at Lowery Gardens-Douglas Fir Trail, on Oct. 17 (2) RB. The bird found at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on the Calgary CBC was first noted there on Dec. $1, D E, O D$.

Most reports were from Calgary during summer and early fall; at Glenmore Reservoir (1) ACS, RC on June 13 \& 26, July 24; Lowery Gardens-Edworthy Park, July 17 (1) and Aug, 13 (2) RB, Aug. 15 (5), 22 \& 29 (10+) ML; Fish Creek P.P. (1) ACS July 25 ; and Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) DE, ACS Aug. 14 \& 29 . There were two very late reports-in the Weaselhead (1) BW on Oct. 18, and at Riley Park (1) JT Oct. 29. The latter bird may have been present since Oct. 26. This species is usually gone by the end of Sep. The only reports away from the city were along Dogpound Creek, 3 km . north-west of Dogpound on June 11, and at Winchell Lake on June 15, both singing, LE, WM, BM, SJ. Another record, in the Taylor-Rosebud area (1) RWS June 13 is just outside our area.
Brown Thrasher Toxastoma rufum $6,0,0$ Uncommon summer visitor

All of the few reports were after mid-May. In the city: at Edworthy Park, May 17 (1) JJP, and May 30 ( 5 singing) AF; at Glenmore Park (1) RC on May 22. In the north-east part of our area, along Kneehills Creek, west of Carbon (1) RWS, NG, SA on May 30. On June 14 in the TaylorRosebud area (1) RWS just beyond the north-east perimeter of our area. There were no reports from west of the city.

Water Pipit $\quad$ Anthus spinoletta 8,0,0 | Abundant migrant |

About (125) on Apr. 22 at W.R.W.C. SJ with (25) Lapland Longspurs, was the first report. Subsequent large spring counts were from Shepard Slough ( $200+$ ) JT on Apr. 24 and (100) AS on May 2; Strathmore, DE (200) on May 8 and Irricana J \& MS (500 \& 350) on May 8 \& 9. None were reported after May 9 until May 29-30 near Big Springs Creek (3) PFS and MacDonald Lake (5) CO on the May Species Count. No reports from the far western part of our area this summer, where listed as a fairly common summer resident in Powell, Sadler \& Powell's Annotated Checklist For The Kananaskis Forest Experiment Station. After two early fall reports, at Irricana (2) GB on Aug 1, and near Water Valley (1) KJ on Aug. 31, none until Sep. 11-12 weekend. High fall counts all came from Namaka-Eagle-Stobart Lakes J \& MS, VM, RR, JT et al ( $100-200$ ) on Sep. 11 \& 12; (1000) on Sep. 18; (2000) on Sep. 25; (50-100) on 0ct. 9-10. Last of the season, also from the Namaka-Eagle Lakes area, were (3) J \& MS, RB on Oct. 23.

## Sprague's Pipit Anthus spragueii $17,0,0 \quad$ Uncommon summer visitor

First spring record was (2) SJ, AFa on Apr. 26 (one singing) at Caldbeck Ridge just south-east of the W.R.W.C. Four more singing birds, including singles, on May 2-3 were located in other areas adjacent to W.R.W.C. SJ by May 9. Subsequent prairie reports from east of the city were from Chestermere Lake (5) ACS on May 15; Shepard (2) AW on May 16 and Irricana-Strathmore JS with a maximum of (5) on July 14. Other records were from Bowmont Flats (1) JJP on May 1 \& 15 ; Cochrane Lake (1) DC, JJP on May 13; Bearspaw (5) JJP on May 19; Bow Valley P.P. (1) DE on May 30; Grand Valley and nearby Forestry Trunk Road (2-3) JT on May 30 and June 3; Water Valley (1) JS, DC on June 5; Nose Hill (4) JJP on June 13; Nose Hill (1-2) JJP on July 1-3; Fish Creek P.P. (1) ACS on July 4 and Bearspaw (3) JJP on July 11. Faanes (Am. Birds 36:991) called special attention to this species in the Northern Great Plains of the U.S. where is has been "suggested that breeding pipits go through two periods of active singing each year, primarily May to early June, and mid-July to late August." In our area, there were reports of from (1-5) birds on at least one date for each week up to July 15 (4 at Irricana); only one report after mid-July at Irricana (1) J \& MS, RB Aug. 2.
Bohemian Waxwing Bombycilla garrulus 0,1192,21 Abundant to common

Found in Calgary during the first 3.8 and the last 2.1 months of the year. High counts per month: North Haven, Jan. 5-12 (150-200) JM; Riley Park, where a Merlin was reported feeding on waxwings (remains found) on Feb. 7 (51) and May 17-19 (25-105) JT; North Haven, Mar. 9-12 (200) JM; Scarboro, Mar. 15 ( 100 ) DD; Lowery Gardens, Mar. $25 \&$ Apr. 9 (30) RB. Last seen in the city at Riley Park on Apr. 20 (5) JT and at Glenmore Reservoir on Apr. 24 (1+) RC. Reappeared at Riley Park on Oct. 28 (2), 29 (30) and Nov. 2 (2) JT, but no further reports in Calgary until the last few days of the month, when numbers showed up at Fish Creek P.P. (40) and Glenmore Reservoir (250-300) on Nov. 28, BW, AW, RB, RWS. Flocks were noted in Dec. along Elbow Drive south-west on the 11 (100) and 29 ( 300 ) DC, and at Fish Creek P.P. on 23 (160) DJS. The Calgary CBC total was similar to last year's (1720), neither close to the high count on the 1976 CBC $(10,359)$.

## Bohemian Waxwing (ctd.)

There were a few scattered reports away from the city: (50) or fewer for the most part, from Irricana, Carseland, Arrowwood and Mossleigh, Bragg Creek, W.R.W.C., Beaupre Hill; Bearspaw area (90) JJP on Apr. 1; enroute from Calgary - Banff (200) J\& MS, PSM on Feb. 19; Ghost Reservoir (125) JJP, SJ on Nov. 19; all within the same range of dates as the city reports. Much later than all other spring reports, and a first for the Yamnuska May Species Count, were (11) D \& MM et al on May 29 in the west part of our area. At W.R.W.C. SJ single spring stragglers were seen on Apr. 29 and May 8 and another stray was heard only, calling in flight overhead, on July 3; the fall movement was a little better, though briefer, than 1982 with six records (flocks of $23-35$ on three of these dates) from Oct. 24 through to Nov. 10. Waxwings have twice been found, in minute numbers compared to Calgary, on previous W.R.W.C. CBCs and once during count week.

The first spring birds turned up in Calgary's north-west at Bulyea Road (6) JJP on June 1 and in Bowness (25) JJP on June 7; at W.R.W.C. (5, 1) LE, SJ on June $8 \& 9$; and along Dogpound Creek, north-west of Dogpound (8) LE, SJ where 2 were seen passing food back and forth on June 11. First reported at Fish Creek P.P. ES on June 11. There were two reports at both Fish Creek P.P. and Glenmore Park over the June 12-13 weekend, and by June 14-19 there were a dozen at the former site, ES. The largest reported numbers built up at Lowery Gardens-Edworthy Park, RB, DC, ML from July 25-Aug. 15 ( $25-50$ ) and Aug. 16-22 (100+) but had plummeted by Aug. 23 (40) and Aug. 29-Sep. 11 (20-15) RB. Elsewhere in Calgary, numbers at Carburn Park, the Weaselhead, Inglewood Bird Sanctuary and Beaverdam Flats never exceeded the peak at Fish Creek P.P. (40) ES on Aug. 29. Only one report after Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) DE Sep. 13: Weaselhead (8) BW on Oct. 25. Besides W.R.W.C. vicinity records, there were several other reports of small numbers from outlying areas: Irricana, NamakaEagle lakes, Millarville, Beaupre and Bow Valley P.P.; (38) were counted on the Horseshoe Canyon CBC on Dec. 18.

Northern Shrike Lanius excubitor $0,1, \mathrm{wk}$ Uncommon winter visitor Reports of (1-4) on six dates for a total of (9-10) shrikes in Jan. including (4) on Jan. 3 for 1981-82 W.R.W.C. CBC; (1-3) on eight dates for a total of at least (7) in Feb.; (1-2) on six dates for a total of (7) in Mar. (1-8) on seven dates for a total of (17) in Apr. including (8) on the 9 th in the Cochrane to Horse Creek-Grand Valley-Westbrook vicinity B \& DC, JJP, (3) on the 24 th, and the last spring record on Apr. 25 at Dogpound Creek, south of Lost Lake SJ. First fall shrikes turned up at W.R.W.C. on Oct. 2 and in Calgary and at Westover Lake on Oct. 6 SJ , JJP. All told, there were reports of (1-2) on eight dates, (11) birds total in Oct.; singles on four dates (3) birds total, in November; and five dates (3) birds total in December, including (1) on the Calgary CBC. In the city there were records from most of the places checked on a regular basis-Carburn Park, Fish Creek P.P., Glenmore Park, Inglewood Bird Sanctuary, the Weaselhead and Bowmont Flats-and there were records in all directions from the city in outlying areas. Shrikes were apparently less in evidence during the winter of 1982-83 than during the previous winter, when (3) and (4) were found on the Calgary and W.R.W.C. CBCs respectively. Few immatures were reported, though this probably reflects more on observer acumen than on immature shrike scarcity; if everyone made an effort to note, when possible, the age of shrikes they see, the resulting ratio of immatures to adults would give some indication of breeding success or failures over the years.

Very few reports, all in May, all singles. First noted near Strathmore DJS on May 2; then (3) on the mid-May weekend, on 15 th at Chestermere Lake ACS and Irricana KJ, PFS, and on the 16 th at Shepard J \& MS; the final report for the year was also from Irricana (1) SJ, JS on May 22. No reports from west of Calgary. An extralimital bird was reported, however, for spring 1980, from the foothills (near Robinson Creek, 2.2 km . north of its confluence with the Ghost River) on May 2 about 17 km . north of Morley SJ, MSm.

European Starling Sturnus vulgaris 245,393,0 Abundant resident
No large counts for late winter. Fifteen hundred was the greatest host of starlings reported in spring 1982, from Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on Mar. 25 DE; many additional counts of $100+$ (max 600) were reported from late Mar. through early June in the city and from Irricana south to Shepard. Areas west to north-west of Calgary supported large numbers too; CochraneW.R.W.C. (85) JJP, B \& DC on Apr. 9; Sibbald Flats (300) J \& MS Apr. 18; W.R.W.C. ( $100-200$ ) SJ Apr. 20-22 and Bow Valley P.P. 100) KJ May 29.
Post-breeding high counts, boosted by large numbers of juveniles, peaked in the Namaka-Eagle lakes area (1000) RB, JS on July 15; Irricana (2000) July 25 and Calgary-Lac des Arcs (1000) J \& MS Sep. 5. Other reports from late summer through early Oct. were of 500 or fewer birds; counts for the rest of the fall and early winter were all less than 100 , except for the Calgary CBC.

Solitary Vireo Vireo solitarius 5,0,0 Uncommon summer visitor
All spring records, other than the May Species Count, are listed below. Ones and twos were observed at Lowery Gardens on six dates from Aug. 13-29 and (2) were at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary DE on Sep. 13.

First observed on May 4 at Carburn Park (1) OD and on May 10 at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (2) DE. Three singing males were located in Glenmore Park south and (3) in Fish Creek P.P. west during June ACS, RFC. There was no increase in numbers during the fall migration although the species became somewhat more widespread in the city during late Aug. The last records were at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (5) AW on Aug 28, at Lowery Gardens (1) RB on Aug. 29 and in Fish Creek P.P. west (1) ACS on Sep. 5.

The first observation came from Glenmore Park south (1) RFC on May 29 followed by Lowery Gardens (1) RB on May 30 and on the same date at Water Valley (1) NG, SEA. During June, (4) singing males were located in Fish Creek P.P. west and (3) in Glenmore Park south ACS, RFC. A nest with two "pinny" young vireos and one unhatched Brown-headed Cowbird egg was found forty feet up in an aspen forked twig on July 9 at the north end of Horsecreek Rd. SJ. The main fall migration was from Aug. 14 to Sep. 5, with the highest count being (5) at Lowery Gardens MJL, RB on Aug. 22-23. The last bird seen was at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) DE on Sep. 13.

Tennessee Warbler Vernivora peregrina 44,0,0 Common summer visitor
First observed in Glenmore Park south on May 9 (1) RFC. On May 30 JS observed (20) at Water Valley, clearly a movement since only (1) was observed at the same location on June 5. On July 4 Fish Creek P.P. west ACS (5) males were singing where none had been heard on June 20. The main fall migration was from Aug, 15 to Sep. 5 with several observations of 10 or more. Highest numbers were in Lowery Gardens (50+) RB, MJL on Aug. 22. The last birds seen were at Riley Park JT on Sep 30 (1) and 0ct. 1 (2).

The first observations were at Edworthy (1) RB on May 2 and at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on May 15 (4) AW and May 16 (1) DJS. Widely recorded throughout late May, June and July. The last date for Fish Creek P.P. JW was Aug. 18 but heavy movements were noted at Lowery Gardens RB, MJL with (50) on Aug. 16, (20+) on Aug. 22 and (30) on Aug. 23. The last birds were at Glenmore Park south (1) RFC on Aug. 28, Lowery Gardens (1) MJL on Aug. 29 and Glenmore Park south (1) RFC on Sep. 18.

Chestnut-sided Warbler Dendroica pensylvanica Vagrant
A spring male was seen at Lowery Gardens RB on June 13.
Magnolia Warbler Dendroica magnolia Rare migrant

A singing male was observed in Brentwood JJP on June 30 and a single bird was in north-west Calgary JM on Aug. 4. Observations of the main fall migration commenced on Aug. 22, with several sightings, after which ones and twos were reported on seven dates to Sep. 22. A straggler was at the W.R.W.C. After commencing on Aug. 15, the fall passage peaked from Sep. 5 with (50) RB at Lowery Gardens and (20) ACS in Fish Creek P.P. west to Sep. 23, during which period counts of around (50) were made in Glenmore Park south RFC, Inglewood AW and Carburn Park OD. Migration continued well into October with (15) DJS along the Bow River near Queensland on Oct. 2 and (10) JS in north-west Calgary on Oct. 4. The last sightings were in north-west Calgary on Oct. 6 (4), Oct. 7 (4) and Oct. 11 (1) JS.

Northern Waterthrush Seirus noveboracensis 5,0,0 Uncommon summer visitor
Reported from Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) AW on May 15, Lost Lake (1 singing) SJ, JJP et al, Water Valley (2) JS on May 30, and Dogpound Creek at Horse Creek Rd. bridge (pr. with male singing) SJ on July 9. Fall observations were on nine dates from Aug. 8-29 totalling nineteen birds.

Thereafter small numbers were reported from several localities through to June 7. Singing males were in Fish Creek P.P. west ACS on July 4 and July 25 . Fall numbers reported were considerably lower than in spring, with up to three birds present at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary DE, AW from Aug. 20-28 and a single at Lowery Gardens DC on Aug. 15.

## Rose-breasted Grosbeak Pheucticus ludovicianus 9,0,0 Uncommon summer visitor

Very few birds reported. The (9) on the May Species Count was a good total and (3) ACS singing in Fish Creek P. P. June 20 suggest possible breeding. A female was observed feeding a stubtailed fledgling at $n$. end of Horse Creek Rd. SJ on July 9. The only other reports were of (1) DE at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary Aug. 14 and 22 and (2) DE at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on Aug. 23 and 24.

## Black-headed Grosbeak

Only (2) records. One female was sighted in Riley Park JT on Aug. 18 and (1) JS near Irricana on Aug. 29.

## Lazuli Bunting

Passerina amoena

The only record was of (9) JJP, DC counted on June 27 between Trap Creek and Highwood Junction, west of Longview during the Highwood Breeding Bird Survey.

A single male was reported in American Birds Volume 36 No. 5. Seen at Cremona on May 26 by N. Olsen fide R. Butot.

Rufous-sided Towhee Pipilo erythrophthalmus $1,0,0$ Uncommon summer visitor
The only reports occurred in May. Three were sighted at Edworthy Park JJP on May 17; West of Bearspaw Reservoir (5) JJP on May 19; Edworthy Park (1) AF on May 30.

American Tree Sparrow Spizella arborea Common migrant Rare winter visitor
Flocks as large as (15) birds were reported wintering in Carburn Park, Calgary from Jan. through to Apr. 12, after which the spring migration seemed quiet-the last bird being reported near Irricana (1) JS on May 22. The fall migration showed much larger numbers and was noted to occur from Sep. 23 through to late Nov. Thirty-three were counted on Oct. 2 in the W.R.W.C. vicinity SJ. The third week of Oct. seemed to be the peak with (87) birds being reported. The last report was Carburn Park (2) ACS on Dec. 5.

Chipping Sparrow Spizella passerina 193,0,0 Common summer visitor
Reported from Apr. 20 to Oct. 3. The height of the spring migration occurred during the last two weeks of May with a high count at Glenmore Reservoir (60) RFC May 22. The fall migration peaked in the last week of Aug. with very few birds being reported after mid-Sep.

Clay-colored Sparrow Spizella pallida 269,0,0 Abundant summer visitor
Reported from May 14 to Sep. 23. This common visitor arrived without any heavy concentrations and was reported throughout the area. The fall migration, on the other hand, resulted in large numbers during the last two weeks of Aug. with over (100) MJL at Lowery Gardens on Aug. 15.
Brewer's Sparrow Spizella breweri Vagrant

Only one record of this species, which breeds on the prairies of southern Alberta and in the higher regions of the Rocky Mountains. One in north-west Calgary JS on Sep. 22.

Vesper Sparrow Pooecetes gramineus 84,0,0 Abundant summer visitor
This common sparrow was seen from May 1 to Sep. 19. By the third week of May they were reported in good numbers especially on the prairies east of Calgary. On Sep. 12 (50) were reported at Namaka JS, but few were seen after that week.

Savannah Sparrow
Passerculus sandwichensis $109,0,0$ Abundant summer visitor
First reported on Apr. 22. The spring migration was predictable with good numbers arriving by the second week of May. A large movement was reported with over (100) JS reported near Shepard on May 8. Most birds had gone by the first week of Oct. but there was a remarkably late sighting of a single bird at the Ghost Reservoir JJP, SJ on Nov. 12.

## Baird's Sparrow Ammodramus bairdii 1,0,0 Uncommon-rare summer

 visitorThere are reports from May 8-Sep. 6. Only five observers offered 16 sightings. Nose Hill had ( $1-2$ singing) JJP on July 1 and ( 4 singing) JJP on July 3. The heaviest concentrations came from east of Calgary with good numbers in July: Irricana-Strathmore (10) JS on July 14; Namaka JS on July 15. Six singing males were also reported on Aug. 1 at Chestermere AW.

## Grasshopper Sparrow Anmodramus savannarum 1,0,0 Vagrant

Apart from the one sighting on the May Species Count, only one other bird was reported. This was near Irricana (1) JS on May 15. This sparrow of the short-grass plains is at the northern edge of its breeding range and is rarely reported in the Calgary area.

LeConte's Sparrow Anmodramus leconteii 26,0,0 Common summer visitor
The first spring record was one singing at the W.R.W.C. SJ on May 13. A maximum of (5) were counted at the W.R.W.C. SJ on May 16 (four were singing). Three were seen at Priddis Slough CFNS on May 16. Low numbers were seen throughout the summer and no birds were reported after Aug. 28 except for a remarkably late sighting near the W.R.W.C. (2) SJ on Oct. 2.

## Sharp-tailed Sparrow Ammodramus caudacutus Rare migrant

This rare transient over the Calgary area was reported on four occasions. Two lone birds were reported singing on June 12, (1) near Irricana JS and (1) near Langdon AW; (1) WH was near Calgary on July 18; a further singing bird was near Chestermere AW on Aug. 1.

Song Sparrow Melospiza melodia 10,0,0 Common summer visitor
Reported from Apr. 22 at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) DE to Nov. 2 s.e. of Bottrel (1-a late straggler) SJ. The spring arrival was reported in reasonable numbers, but there were relatively few reports of the fall migration-only eight birds in Sep. and none in Oct.

Lincoln's Sparrow Melospiza lincolnii 25,0,0 Common summer visitor
The spring arrival was first noted on Apr. 29 at Inglewood Bird Sanctuary (1) DE, after which 52 birds were reported in May. During June and July this species was heard or seen daily at the W.R.W.C. where perhaps $10+$ pairs hold territories every year. The fall migration peaked during the last weekend of Aug. 29-31 with (30) birds recorded. The last sighting was on Oct. 8 at Lowery Gardens (1) JJP.

## Swamp Sparrow <br> Melospiza georgiana <br> Rare migrant

There were five reports in our area of this seldom-reported species: May 7-9 at W.R.W.C. (1) SJ; Oct. 1 at W.R.W.C. (1) SJ; Oct. 2 near W.R.W.C. (2) SJ: Oct. 28 at Morley (1) SJ; a late, well documented sighting on Nov. 19 at Ghost Reservoir dam (1) SJ \& JJP.

White-throated Sparrow Zonotrichia albicollis 13,2,0 Uncommon summer visitor Common fall migrant Rare winter visitor
Two wintering birds were reported regularly from Jan. through to Mar. in north-west Calgary JWT \& JMicC. The first spring record was at the W.R.W.C. (1) SJ on May 10 with regular reports through June and July. Numbers began to peak in the last week of Sep. on fall migration with the last reports on Oct. 16 except for unusual sightings of (2) on the Calgary CBC (these birds subsequently wintered) and (1) ACS in Haysboro on Dec. 28.

White-crowned Sparrow Zonotrichia leucophrys 14,0,0 Common summer visitor
The first spring record was at W.R.W.C. (3) SJ on Apr. 25 with a large passage between May 4 and 13. There were isolated reports in June and July. The fall passage reported fewer birds but seemed to be heaviest in mid-Sep. No birds were recorded after Oct. 2 when (4) SJ were seen at Ovan's Slough and along nearby Horse Creek.

Most June and July records came from areas north or west of Calgary. A nest with four eggs was found on the Swanson Hills cutline SJ on May 29. Four 3-4 day old young were present when the nest was re-visited on June 12. The fall migration was lengthy and steady with good numbers being reported into the first week of Nov. A lingering group of (4) JWT was seen in Riley Park until Dec. 16.

## Lapland Longspur <br> Calcarius lapponicus <br> Common migrant

Reported from Apr. 17 at Nose Hill (4) JJP et al to Nov. 6, when a single straggler was seen and heard at the W.R.W.C. SJ. Flocks on spring migration were relatively small i.e. May 1 Irricana (300) ACS, Apr. 25 Irricana (300) DE. Mid-Sep. however, provided a high report of (1000) JS between Calgary and Namaka on Sep. 19 and (2000) JS at Namaka on Sep. 25.

Chestnut-collared Longspur Calcarius ornatus $15,0,0$ Uncommon summer visitor
All of the 17 reports of this bird came from areas to the east of Calgary. There were (11) in May, (2) in June, (3) in July and a single fall report on Sep. 19. The high count was at Irricana (50) JS on May 24.

Snow Bunting
Plectrophenox nivalis $0,0,120$ Common winter visitor
Large flocks were reported in the first three months of the year, with most birds being recorded east of the city. The high count was Jan. 31 in north-west Calgary (5000) JS. By midApr. most birds had left with the last report on Apr. 24 at Irricana (2) KJ. A single bird was seen on Sep. 19 at Lake Minnewanka JS but the main return was not until early Nov, with (1000) JS estimated on Nov. 6 near Chestermere.

By May 1 over (100) were counted by various observers in the Keoma, Kathyrn, Irricana area, and numbers continued high and observations widespread though the summer. Large fall flocks of over (300) were reported from the Cheadle, Eagle Lake, Namaka area on Sep. 19 ACS and 0ct. 9 JS , with flocks of (50) RWS, JS being reported from this area until 0ct. 23.
Western Meadowlark Sturnella neglecta $51,0,0 \quad$ Common summer visitor

The first report was at Irricana (2) JS on Mar. 27 followed by singles at Carseland ES, JB on Apr. 4 and at Strathmore RWS and Eagle Lake ACS on Apr. 9. Numbers remained low through Apr. but built up quickly at the beginning of May when ( $25+$ ) RWS, JS, BB were counted in the Kathyrn, Keoma, Irricana area on May 1. Numbers remained steady through to late Sep. as (25) JS were reported in the Namaka area on Sep. 25. Oct. reports were, from Namaka (5) JS on 9th and (7) JS on 23rd, Eagle Lake (3) JS on 11th and Nose Hill (1) JJP on 14th.

Early singles were reported from Morley on Apr. 10 and Inglewood Bird Sanctuary on Apr. 18 ACS. By the first few days of May numbers had built up to ( $50+$ ) in the areas east of Calgary. Fall flocks had formed by late Aug. and on Aug. 29 a count of (400) JS was at Irricana and (1000) JS were at Namaka on Sep. 6. Numbers at Namaka declined to (200) JS on Oct. 11 and (100) JS on 0ct. 23. Also on Oct. 23 (8) RWS were seen at Glenmore Park. Feeding on aquatic plants in an open seep in woodland at Twin Bridges, (6) ACS were observed on Nov. 28.
Common Grackle Quiscalus quiscala 2,0,0 Uncommon summer visitor

Tent were at Strathmore on Apr. 24 DE and up to (6) birds were seen in the Keoma, Irricana area throughout May. A single was at Lowery Gardens on June 7 RB. There were only two fall records of Common Grackles: Calgary (1) JS on Aug. 2 and Lowery Gardens (1) RB on Aug. 23.

The last birds, reported to be in fine breeding plumage, were seen Apr. 25, although there were undocumented reports of May birds. In contrast, the fall of 1982 was notable for the absence of redpolls. Only fourteen reports were received, mostly from the W.R.W.C. -Ghost Reservoir area with a high count of (16) on Nov. 19. The count of (74) on the W.R.W.C. CBC was well down from the (537) of the previous winter, and the Calgary CBC found none compared to the 243 of the previous year.

## RARE BIRD DESCRIPTIONS

## 1. Garganey Anas querquedula

Observed on June 12, 13 and 15, 1982. One adult male on irrigation pond near Strathmore observed for a total of 165 minutes by Moray J. Lewis. $7 \times 35$ binoculars and $20-40 x$ Zeiss Binocular Telescope were used to study the bird at a distance of $10-200 \mathrm{~m}$. On June 12 and 13 the weather was clear and lighting was excellent. June 15 was overcast and lighting was fair to good. The bird was photographed on June 13. Although Blue-winged Teal, Green-winged Teal and Cinnamon Teal were all present, the Garganey was distinctive enough that no confusion arose. This was the observer's first experience with a querquedula. Field guides were consulted after the initial observation to confirm the identification.

Description - Smaller than male Blue-winged Teal. Head with brown crown and cheeks. Prominent white stripe extends from just in front of eye over the eye back towards the nape then extending downwards along the side of neck. Breast brown mottled with black. Back dark gray. Flanks white with fine vertical black striping. Barring lightest immediately to the rear of the breast. Rump, tail and undertail coverts mottled gray-brown. Wing coverts very pale blue-gray. Speculum metallic green bordered with white. Long ornamental scapulars black with white central vane curved down over the flanks when the bird was at rest. Bill dark gray proportionately shorter than Blue-winged Teal. Iris dark brown. Feet, legs and underparts not clearly seen.

Behaviour - For most of the time under observation the bird fed from the water suface in manner similar to Blue-winged or Cinnamon Teal. It was not observed to tip up while feeding. On June 13 the bird joined a party of courting Blue-winged Teal ( 1 female, up to 8 males) and behaviour typical of Garganey courtship was observed. The bird would draw its head back until it laid along the back and bring the head quickly forward and downward at the same time producing a crackling growl. This display was seen about six times. The Garganey accompanied the female Blue-winged Teal and her apparent mate for about one hour. The growl was the vocalization heard that I could attribute to the Garganey.

## 2. Red Phalarope Phalaropus fulicaria

One on October 26, 1982 along the north shore of Cochrane Lake. It looked much like a Rednecked Phalarope at first, but the bill was too stout, proportionately more like a Sanderling's and the back all pale grey without marking, unlike the Red-necked's "snipe-streaked" back. The underparts were white but the sides showed some grey streaks in the feathers that were fluffed up over the wing - very few grey-streaked feathers though. The head was also white, with a black patch around the eye and on auriculars behind eye, and with black and white mottled crown patch, solid black only at edge of crown patch, just above white eyebrow line, and also more solid at rear of crown. From this point, a narrow black line ran down the back of the neck meeting the grey of the back. This black line was so narrow at the nape that the white almost met there from the sides of the head and neck. The forehead was white. Grey of the back extended down on the sides of breast. Line down back of neck was widest where it met back and looked tinged with brown in certain light and at certain angles. Wings folded looked black too. Chin and throat looked stained with tawny. The bill was solid black. No trace of yellow was seen, even at the base. On careful examination, it looked like the grey of some back feathers might be edged with white. The bird's legs and extended wings were not seen.


This bird swam quite close to shore, within 40-50 ft. of where I lay prone on the ground (using $22 x$ Bushnell 'scope) and it rested in water at the shore for a while but did not emerge on the narrow beach. Lighting was good, skies overcast but light still bright coming from one side (S.W.; I was looking at bird from N.W.)

Behaviour - It fed in typical phalarope fashion, spinning round in a circle, creating a slight whirlpoot and picking foodstuff from the water as it spun. The bird was watched for at least 15 minutes until it moved out to 50 m . off shore when a woman passed by with a dog. The wing stripe was not observed as the bird was not seen flying.

## 3. Black-legged Kittiwake Rissa tridactyla

"Notes concerning a sighting of a Kittiwake at a lake near Calgary, Alberta"
Notes on the sighting of the third Alberta record of a Kittiwake were filed by J. Steeves with the CFNS, NMNH and AB. The original contained sections:- Date written, Species, Date seen Observers, Locality, Equipment Used, Conditions, Habitat, Comments of other observers, Comparison species, Description, Possible confusion species, Experience with species, Habits, Discussion Status inland, Sketches from photographs and a colour slide.

The sections above are mentioned to give observers an idea of the type of information desired in a report, but for space concerns only the section up to and including "Possible confusion species" are presented.

Date Written: 7 June from notes of 6 June 1982.
Species: Black-legged Kittiwake (Rissa tridactyla) Number of birds - one
Date Seen: 6 June at approximately 0830 - 0900 hours and again at approximately $1000-1015$ hours MDT
Observers: Marion and John Steeves (Writer) at both times. Bill Wilson and a friend of his at the last time.
Locality: Bruce Lake, a lake about 30 km . north-east of Calgary, Alberta. (Map 113255113 ) Nearest village is Keoma (Highway 566).
Equipment Used: $x 10$ binocular, $\times 20$ monocular mounted on car-window with a window mount and a 35 mm camera (Vivitar) equipped with 300 mm lens (Takumar) loaded with 400 ASA Ektachrome (daylight) slide film.
Conditions: The day was cloudy bright with occasional light rain. The temperature was about 1C and the wind was from the NE at about $10 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{hr}$. The hidden sun was behind us giving us front-lighted birds.
Habitat: Bruce Lake is about 3.5 km by 1.5 km . Water is supplied by an irrigation system that runs through the area from a canal starting at the Bow River. It is one of the largest lakes in the immediate area. It attracts large numbers of nesting gull, duck, grebe etc. Farm land surrounds the lake.
Comments of other observers: MS on reviewing the field marks came to the conclusion that it was a Kittiwake. Bill Wilson was told that we had seen a Kittiwake and he and his companion viewed the gull and came to the same conclusion.
Comparison Species:
When we came to the lake we saw a group of birds. In the water were about fifteen Double-crested Cormorants (Phalacrocorax auritus) which were diving and swimming in typical cormorant fashion. Above them in a hovering attitude were about twenty Common Terns (Sterno hirundo), three or four Ring-billed Gulls (Larus delawarensis) and the bird under discussion. The birds constantly followed the cormorants to various areas at the north part of the
lake. The comparison is of some importance because we were able on this first sighting to see that the bird in question had a smaller wing span than the Ring-billed Gulls and had a yellow unmarked bill.
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DESCRIPTION:

## A. From Field Notes

A white-headed gull of a size smaller than the common ring-billed gull. The bill, the first attention-getting field mark of something different was a light yellow (greenish-lemon MS). Its shape was different than the ring-bill being shorter and with the upper mandible steeply curved. The bill was of a uniform color without any other markings. The eye was dark. The white head was quite rounded but fairly large in comparison with the rest of the bird so that one did not get the impression of a 'gentle appearing gull' (e,g, Mew - L. canus) but rather a 'bull-headed gull'. The legs which could clearly be seen hanging while the bird was hovering were black-appearing. Behind the eye was a dark area like one seen on a winter Bonaparte's Gull (L. philadclphia) but were much fainter. The wing tips were a solid black, had no 'white mirrors' and were not nearly as extensive black as delawarensis. These wing tips are often described as 'dipped-in-ink' but in this bird gave a slight crescent shape which was probably caused by a subterminal black spot on one of the primaries. When the bird was sitting on the water this separate black spot could clearly be seen within the white of the primaries. The base of the primaries was white or very pale grey and this color gave way to a pale grey on the secondaries like the grey on delawarensis. The same color of grey was found on the back. When this bird was sitting the black tipped primaries could be seen then the white area and then a grey area (while on delawarensis there was more extensive black and then immediately the grey of the wings, back etc.). The trailing edge of the wings was white. In shape, the wings were long, for the body size and of medium width. The remainder of the plumage was white. Most species of birds have their own unique shape; gulls are no exception but how they differ often becomes impossible to describe adequately. The shape becomes recognizable because of outline, marks and experience.
B. From Photographs (brief comments only)

One mark that was not noted at the sighting was the slightly notched tail when it was folded.

A second mark which is fairly obvious in the photographs is the white color at the base of the primaries and which is not noted in most of the popular field guides.

Confusion Species
A. In Alberta, in June, an adult Kittiwake can resemble an adult Ring-billed or a California Gull (L. californicus). This is because most of us think that every white-headed gull would be one of these two species. The gull flocks for the most part are not scrutinized carefully.
B. Once a bird has been detected as different from the above we come to the most likely confusion bird - The MEW GULL. As adults both have relatively short yellow unmarked bill, black wing-tips, grey back, grey wings, dark eyes and the rest of the body white. The Mew Gull was finally eliminated because:-

1. The grey on the back and wings appeared too light for a Mew Gull (but see P.J.Grant under discussion section later) and the grey gave way to white at the base of the primaries. In the mew, the uniform darker grey runs to the more extensively black-tipped and 'mirrored primaries'.
2. The head was too massive. In the mew the head is small so that leads to a 'gentle' appearing gull.
3. There was a dark area in the auricular area and this would not be expected in a mew.
4. The bird had black legs while the mew gull has greenish legs.

## 4. Ancient Murrelet Synthliboramphus antiquus

Observed on Glenmore Lake, Calgary between Oct. 17 and 20. This bird was seen on Oct. 20 close to shore at the Canoe Club floats. The bird was in winter plumage having a black head, chin and back of neck. The black extended about $1 / 4$ to $1 / 3$ the way out on both the upper and lower mandibles. The distal $2 / 3$ or $3 / 4$ of the mandibles were pale, looking yellowish in bright sunlight at a distance, but at close range ca. 50 ft ., maybe $30-40 \mathrm{ft}$. in the 'scope looked pinkish white or pale flesh-white, and this colour extended the length of gape to the base of bill. Underparts were noted to be white from the throat to the undertail coverts, but white on the sides where the sides meet the wings is not "cleanly" cut, contrasting with grey of back and wings, and has smudgey diagonal lines on the sides, indistinct. White on the throat extends up side of neck to just below auricular patch. This white/black line is clean, with distinct contrast. The underside of the wings was white with dark at the leading and trailing edges. This was noted when the murrelet stood up in the water to flap its wings.


Flight feathers were noted to be dark, blackish where they just showed at wing-tips (folded wings) above vent.

Behaviour - While people were about, the murrelet spent most of its time near the far shore. When it dived, its wings could be seen flapping underwater as the water was so clear. Moments before diving, it's tail would be thrust upward, chest sunk underwater, then suddenly it would tip up with wings half open and swim sea turtle-like (wings flapping like flippers) at a steep angle. This bird was observed for a minimum of 60 minutes and three photographs at a distance of 30 ft . or so were secured. Other observers present were J.J. Podlubny, Stuart Alexander and Peter Sherrington.

Date Written: 1 September 1982
Species: Pine Warbler (Dendroica pinus) Number of birds - one Date Seen: 1 September 1982
Location: 1720 Bowness Road NW Calgary, Alberta. The bird was found in the backyard. It has among other trees Lodgepole Pine, Choke Cherry, Lilac and Apple. Two bird water baths are kept running during the fall migration.
Conditions: Sunny and frontlighted. The distance to the bird was about 8 meters. The temperature was about 22 C and the wind was from the NW at about $12 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{hr}$.
Equipment Used: X10 binocular
Comparison Species: Wilson's Warbler (Wilsonia pusilla)
DESCRIPTION: The bird was seen three times over a 45 minute period and the following field marks were noted. My first thought was a fall Blackpoll Warbler (D. striata) but then I noted the dark legs and light feet which would be different from most of the Blackpoll that pass through the yard. At first I noticed only a hint of white at the tail corners but later when the bird preened after bathing I clearly saw a patch of white on the upper tail corners. I was not able to see any streaks on the back even though I had several good looks. The undertail coverts were immaculate white. Other field marks noted were: - two prominent white wing bars; chin, throat, belly-a very pale yellow; flanks the same yellow but with some dusky marks; the yellow of the belly blended into the white of the rest of the abdomen; a faint brownish eyestripe; a fairly dark brown color on the crown, hindneck, back and white undertail spots.
Habits: Moved much less quickly than the comparison species. Seemed to stay for the most part in the Choke Cherry tree but due to heavy foliage it was difficult to see. No tail wagging was observed. Came several times to water from lawn water sprinkler that was sprinkling the cherry tree.
Confusion Species: The fall warblers that have come to the yard resembling the bird have been Blackpoll. All have had light legs and none have an upper tail with white corner areas. The Bay-breasted Warbler (D. castanea) usually has some evidence of the mature facial pattern and also the species is heavily streaked on the back and has very buff undertail coverts.

A confusion still exists as regards the light feet of the bird with a sharp demarcation to dark leg as my references do not mention this combination of field marks.
Experience with Species: I have seen the species many times in eastern Canada and the United States. Most views were of spring birds which were singing in White Pine and therefore caused little confusion.

(xiii) Comments:

A bird easily overlooked in spring and fall. In spring when on territory this bird can be detected by those with some warbler experience but it must be remembered that bird watchers are few in number in this province and when the total area is considered it must be obvious that only a very, very small fraction of the possible habitat of this species is checked. In the fall the problem becomes even more difficult as this species can be one of the most difficult to identify even by those who have had considerable experience.
