COVID-19 Protocols

The following protocols apply to $\mbox{In}/\mbox{Outside}$ City single and multi Destination Trips

- 1. Maximum of 10 Participants including the leader.
- 2. Participants must be members of Nature Calgary.
- 3. Pre-registration is required.
- 4. Participants must sign a waiver form either on site or bring one already signed. Bring your own pen to sign the waiver form.
- 5. Masks or face shields must be worn when outside the vehicle.
- 6.Carpooling should only be done with occupants of the same household or bubble.
- 7. Refrain from sharing scopes, binoculars, field guides, etc. with people outside of your bubble.
- 8. Maximum of 5 vehicles plus the leader's vehicle.

Since retiring in 2016 Andrew Hart has made several visits to India. This presentation will center on the Western Ghats, a mountain range that runs parallel to the west coast of India. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and is one of the eight hot-spots of biological diversity in the world. It contains a large proportion of the country's flora and fauna, many of which are endemic. The area is predominantly rural and the presentation will describe a number of interactions with local people as well some of the natural history highlights including Nagarhole National Park.



Calgary's 69th Annual Christmas Bird Count

The results from Calgary's 69th annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC) were shared by Phil Cram at the January Bird Study Group. Despite the adversity posed by COVID-19, Calgary organizers adapted to ensure the event could proceed on January 20th, 2020.

Team sections (see map) were divided into smaller areas where 1-2 people (unless from the same household) surveyed. This allowed for greater coverage of areas perhaps overlooked in past years. Feeder Watchers (FW) also played an important part in helping to count and document species. 130 field surveyors and 187 FW participated (a new FW record for Calgary).

A total of 69 species were identified on count day and the total number of individual birds was 59,379. Canada Goose (26,641) was the most abundant bird species with the majority seen along the Elbow and Bow River. Mallard (11,809) and House Sparrow (6906) capped off the top three bird species. There were three all-time first bird species observed on count day in the Calgary circle: 1 Anna's Hummingbird, 1 Mountain Bluebird, and 1 Swainson's Thrush! <u>Click Here</u> to explore the CBC YYC 2020 Map for yourself.

Birding By Bike

In the urban planner's book of jargon, it's referred to as NMT (Non-Motorized Transport). Bill Wilson has been birding via bike for over 10 years and recently celebrated his most successful year with 259 species (a new NMT birding record for Alberta). It was no easy task as he rode a total distance of 9100 kilometers throughout the province (140 km was the longest single trip). For these kinds of birding expeditions, Bill might leave his house at 1 AM to make it in time for the prime birding hour. Birding by bike is an extension of Bill's leisure time, where he combines two of his biggest passions that form unforgettable experiences. He noted that with some luck on your side and time (spent biking) in the field, birding by bike may be the way to go to improve your personal bests. With Calgary's incredible and ever-expanding bicycle network, this could be your year to challenge yourself to an NMT birding experience. If you're really up for a challenge, try to take the big NMT Alberta birds 260!
